

Context:

The Mont Scenery National Park comprises the northern part of Saba plus the centrally located Mont Scenery above 550 m height, an area of approximately 25% of the total island area (see map) ranging from the shoreline to the highest top of the island. The area is predominantly wilderness and contains all six of the vegetation zones found on Saba.

Main fauna populations and/or those of particular importance present (resident or migratory) in the area:

Birds: There are 26 species of bird that breed in the area, including the endangered Bridled Quail-dove (Geotrygon mystacea), with a further 36 species using the island as a migratory stop over. Of the breeding populations, 9 species or sub-species of forest dwelling bird are endemic to the Lesser Antilles and/or the Virgin Islands.

Reptiles and Amphibians: There are 10 species of reptile and the only amphibian found on Saba is Johnstone's Whistling Frog (Eleutherodactylus johnstonei).

Other animals: A total of 86 species of invertebrate have been accounted for on Saba, including the endangered Mountain Crab (Gecarcinus ruricola), 14 species of snail and 70 insect species including 27 butterflies.





Main ecosystems in the area:

Terrestrial: Mount Scenery Nature Park encompasses a variety of habitats. Deep ravines, that form refuges for vegetation including primary rainforest, are etched into the steep slopes.

The Mount Scenery Nature Park contains all of the vegetation zones found on Saba, from sea level to the summit of Mt Scenery; dry coastal shrub, dry evergreen forest, secondary rainforest (with primary rainforest in the ravines), tree-fern brake, palm brake and elfin woodland.

Potential Threats:

Nine key threats to the biodiversity Mont Scenery National Park were identified, with a tenth, climate change identified as an over-arching threat. There are four classified as severe threats: invasive, terrestrial predatory fauna species; invasive, terrestrial flora; extreme wind; and introduced genetic material. Five are classifieds as moderate threats: residential development; avalanches and landslides; small-holder grazing, ranching or farming; landfill development; and terrestrial problematic species/diseases of unknown origin.
